It is with great enthusiasm that I recommend Julie Skolnick as a professional learning speaker on the topics of gifted and twice-exceptional (2e) learners. Julie recently led an impactful training session for our educators, and the results were nothing short of transformative.

- The importance of **personal connection**, affirmation, and empathy in serving GT and 2e students
- Recognition that gifted does not always mean high achieving, and that behavior is
 often communication
- Practical tools, such as **PRAISE strategies**, **midline stretches**, and even **AI resources**, that could be used in classrooms immediately
- A renewed sense of confidence and purpose—many participants shared that they now feel equipped with the language and strategies to support students they hadn't known how to reach before

Several attendees described the session as "life-changing," "eye-opening," and "the best professional development of their career." Many took pages of notes and left with not only actionable strategies but a mindset shift that will change how they view—and value—their gifted and 2e learners.

Julie's book, *Gifted and Distractible*, served as an invaluable complement to the training, and many educators have already expressed excitement about using it as a year-round reference.

I give Julie Skolnick my highest recommendation. If your goal is to empower educators with knowledge, empathy, and tools to truly support gifted and twice-exceptional students, Julie's training is not just helpful—it is essential.
